Questions & Answers

- 1. Can we collaborate with our Ukrainian sister city to utilise CERV tools?**
Response: Yes, Ukraine is a participating country in the CERV programme, so you can collaborate on CERV projects with your Ukrainian partner.
- 2. Regarding consortium partners from different countries, should they carry out identical activities, or can the activities be similar but not identical?**
Response: An 'event' occurs within a defined timeframe and may consist of various activities (e.g., conferences, workshops, training sessions, seminars, debates, webinars, exhibitions, campaigns, surveys, research, etc.), aiming to bring people together and involve the direct and verifiable participation of the target groups. Activities do not have to be identical. However, it is crucial to align them with the priority under which your consortium is submitting the proposal.
- 3. Does the grant cover only 60% of project costs?**
Response: No. If selected for funding, you will receive the full lump sum calculated using the lump sum calculator. You are not required to justify the total amount spent to implement your project. The lump sum is designed to cover part of the project, not the entire cost. The 60% refers to the pre-financing received at the project's start. The remaining 40% is disbursed upon submission of the final report and successful implementation of all work packages.
- 4. Are projects involving youth as a target group or cooperation with schools eligible?**
Response: Yes, if the activities fall under one of the three priorities of the call. Any private organisation implementing activities involving children (under 18) must submit a child protection policy covering the four areas outlined in the Keeping Children Safe Child Safeguarding Standards. Public entities must submit a declaration of honour on child protection compliance at the Grant Agreement Preparation (GAP) stage (template provided by EACEA).
- 5. Could you clarify the difference between a public and a private NGO?**
Response: Non-governmental organisations (NGOs) are private legal entities.

- 6. What is the co-financing rate? Is the programme 100% EU-funded?**
Response: In the CIV-Call, there is no specific co-financing rate. If selected for funding, you will receive the full lump sum calculated via the lump sum calculator. However, these lump sums are structured to cover only part of the project, not the entire cost.
- 7. What kind of work packages (WPs) need to be included? Does each event require a WP and does “event” include training sessions and workshops?**
Response: Yes, each line in the lump sum calculator must correspond to a work package in your application. A work package can include various activities such as workshops, training sessions, communication efforts, etc.
- 8. Can you clarify the percentage of co-financing?**
Response: See above—there is no fixed co-financing percentage. If selected, you will receive a lump sum that covers part of your project costs.
- 9. What qualifies as an international partner?**
Response: An international partner is an organisation based in a different country than your own.
- 10. Are for profit companies eligible?**
Response: No. Only non-profit organisations are eligible for this call. Lead applicants (coordinators) must be non-profit private legal entities or public universities. Co-applicants must be non-profit legal entities (public or private bodies) or international organisations.
- 11. Is co-financing required from beneficiaries, or does the funding cover all costs? - Response:** See above (question 8).
- 12. Are only non-profit companies eligible?**
Response: Yes, only non-profit organisations can apply. See eligibility criteria.
- 13. Does ‘transnational’ mean a third/non-EU country must be involved?**
Response: No. Transnational means collaborating with an organisation from another participating country. Eligible countries include EU Member States and, currently, Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kosovo, Serbia, and Ukraine.
- 14. How many years of operation must a non-profit organisation have to meet the financial eligibility criteria?**
Response: There is no requirement for a minimum number of operational years. Newly established entities with at least one closed annual financial account may still be eligible.
- 15. Can public bodies or agencies established by municipalities apply if they have legal status as an association?**
Response: Yes, public non-profit legal entities are eligible as co-applicants.

16. How can projects ensure sustainability and long-term engagement beyond the event-focused funding?

Response: Please refer to the impact evaluation criteria in the call document.

17. Is there a predefined list of lump sum amounts based on the number of countries, participants, and event format?

18. Can consultancy services for governance tools be included in the WP?

Response: Work packages focus on events, and each event may include several activities. The grants are lump sums, so costs do not need to be justified if the expected number of events and participants are met.

19. Are for-profit companies that are 100% publicly owned eligible?

Response: No, for-profit organisations are generally ineligible. Please check page 13 of the call document.

20. How should costs for the kick-off meeting be included?

Response: Travel costs for up to two participants attending the Brussels kick-off meeting are eligible, covering return flights and one night's accommodation.

21. Could you explain the 60% pre-financing and total funding process?

Response: After the grant agreement is signed, pre-financing (normally 60%) is provided within 30 days. The remaining 40% is paid after the final report submission and project verification.

22. Can two NGOs from different countries, affiliated with the same international NGO, partner under this call?

Response: Yes.

23. Must all activities within the same WP occur at the same time and location?

Response: No, activities within a single WP do not need to be on the same day or in the same place.

24. How many applications can an NGO submit?

Response: There is no limit, but identical or very similar projects will not be funded multiple times.

25. Can public bodies participate as non-lead partners?

Response: Yes, as co-applicants.

- 26. Is subcontracting allowed, and how should these costs be justified?**
Response: Subcontracting is permitted but should be limited (under 30% of total costs unless justified in the application).
- 27. Are staff costs covered?**
Response: Yes, see the guidance document for a breakdown of eligible costs. For a detailed list of covered costs including travel and subsistence, room rental/interpretation/translation/technical resources, communication/dissemination costs, please consult the following document: https://ec.europa.eu/info/funding-tenders/opportunities/docs/2021-2027/cerv/guidance/ls-decision_cerv_en.pdf
- 28. Can consultancy fees for IT tools be included?**
Response: See Q18 above.
- 29. Should the budget distribution between partners be proportionate?**
Response: Not necessarily; it depends on each partner's role and responsibilities.
- 30. Is prior experience in CERV an advantage for lead applicants?**
Response: No, the programme welcomes new applicants. However, please bear in mind that the very large majority of selected leaders in the past have been well-established organisations.
- 31. Is there a focus on the EU election process in this call?**
Response: No, but projects should align with EU democratic engagement policies.
- 32. How is a project's transnational nature demonstrated?**
Response: Through international partnerships and broad dissemination of results.
- 33. How should hybrid events be structured in the Excel file?**
Response: Two lines should represent the in-person and online participants separately.
- 34. Are participant residence details required?**
Response: Yes, to verify country representation.
- 35. Are additional CERV calls planned for 2025?**
Response: Yes, check the indicative calendar: https://commission.europa.eu/document/download/e1b129e4-87ce-4fc8-93ae-d2a4b4ecff57_en?filename=CERV%20indicative%20call%20planning%202025.pdf
- 36. Can international participants join multiple WPs within one trip?**
Response: No, activities spanning multiple days are considered a single WP.

QUESTIONS FROM THE CHAT:

“Would it be possible to collaborate with a partner online and use the grant for a joint trip to a third town?”

Response: As long as the requirements outlined in the budget table are met (including the number of events and participants from the specified number of countries), you will receive the allocated funds, which can be used as needed within the scope of your project.

“Are only public universities eligible? What about private universities? I believe we have a project running from a private university in Cyprus.”

Response: Private universities are eligible if they can demonstrate non-profit status.

“Must activities within the same WP take place within the same timeframe and location?”

Response: Activities within a single WP should be connected thematically or organisationally but may take place at different times and locations.

“What about partnerships in the Western Balkans region? Are Serbia, North Macedonia, Montenegro, and Bosnia and Herzegovina sufficient to meet eligibility criteria?”

Response: Yes. Partners (leaders and co-applicants) must be formally established in one of the eligible countries: EU + associated partner countries. The consortium must include at least two partners from two different eligible countries. “Can the partnership involve member organisations of one’s own European organisation?”

Response: To ensure clarity and avoid potential funding conflicts, either the umbrella organisation or one or more of its members should be formal partners in the project. If the umbrella organisation itself is a partner, it should seek additional partners from outside its network. Alternatively, if member organisations participate individually, multiple members can become partners. This approach helps prevent double financing between the umbrella organisation and its members.

“How should the costs of the kick-off meeting be included?”

Response: These should be incorporated within a WP (typically at the start of the project).

“Will there be a separate event to discuss the CERV Children’s Rights Call?”

Response: We have not yet planned a specific event for the Child Call, but we may organise one. You can check the registration form here: <https://eu.jotform.com/euform/CERV-forum>. National Contact Points will also provide updates on their websites, as well as on their LinkedIn and Facebook pages.

“Were you able to cover all project costs through CERV funding, or did you need additional funding?”

Response: This question was directed to the two project presenters, and both answered directly during the session.

“Is there a list detailing lump sum amounts based on the number of participating countries, participants, and virtual/in-person formats?”

“Can consultancy fees for developing IT tools be included in the expenses?”

Response: As long as the project meets the requirements outlined in the budget table, the allocated funds can be used within the project’s scope.

“Is the budget in the Call document (33m) for multiple programmes, or just for the three listed priorities?”

Response: It is specifically for this call and its three priorities, as outlined in the presentation.

“Do applicants determine the number of participants required for a work package?”

Response: Yes. The minimum is 25 participants for in-person events and 101 for online events, from at least two different countries.

“What other activities besides events are typically funded? How many applications were submitted and funded in previous rounds?”

Response: As long as the requirements in the budget table are met, the funds can be used as needed. In previous rounds: 2022 – 168 applications submitted, 79 funded. 2023 – 450 applications submitted, 88 funded.

“Can you clarify ‘Number of direct participants’? If an activity in Italy involves 50 Italian and 50 foreign participants, is the total 100? Are conference attendees counted?”

Response: Direct participants are those who actively engage in project activities. Spectators or visitors do not count as direct participants; individuals who interact and contribute meaningfully do.

“How do you calculate participants for an event focused on developing an online tool? By the number of visitors?”

Response: Participants must actively engage with the project to qualify as direct participants.

Response: Yes, as long as it is a registered non-profit private entity.

“Can we combine participants from smaller events to meet the required threshold? Do these events need to be pre-declared?”

Response: Provide a realistic plan for meeting participant numbers. Additional sub-events may be added later if necessary. Each participant counts only once per WP.

“Can we apply with multiple projects on different priorities?”

Response: Yes, but each proposal must focus on one priority. If leading multiple proposals, only one is likely to be selected.
